LAST MEETING

At our last Social Meeting on the 18th May, a potentially exciting scoop for EVRG was announced by Ian Chalk, with the news that our Patron Kenneth Cox has offered a hybrid rhododendron with red foliage. This plant, developed by Kenneth and his father, is named "Ever red" & along with its red blooms has deep red/burgundy coloured leaves, making it a most unusual and attractive bush. However, there are some hurdles to be overcome before we are able to possess the plant. Only tissue culture in vitro (in glass tubes) would be able to be imported & then there are strict quarantine laws in Tasmania to satisfy as well. Granted, there are challenges but a potentially exciting development for our garden.

Smaller offerings were offset by the quality of blooms on the flower voting table, where Ian Chalk's vireya "Simbu Sunset" took top placing. A Protea and a Leucadendron from the Tavner's garden were first & second in the cut flower section.

Our guest speaker, Jeremy Ritch, formerly west Park Nursery and now at Bunnings plant department, spoke about his career path in the plant retail field. From a young lad who didn't know what a hydrangea was to his current level of knowledge and expertise has been an interesting journey.

It's sad to say goodbye to Autumn, as the deciduous trees sure did put on a colourful display for us this season, but winter is here. We have welcomed a few new volunteers that have decided to help us around the garden, and they sure are making a dent on my 'to do' list! Their names are Alan Dobson and Dave Page, and so far they are in the process of upgrading the walking tracks, loading bales up and putting mulch around our new plants, constantly cleaning drains and water ways and are very handy with the chainsaw too! R. bureavii

One of the most outstanding rhododendrons in the Taliense series is R. bureavii, which was discovered by Abbe Delavay in 1886 in northwest Yunnan. Other collections were made in the same area and also west Sichuan where it was found to be growing in open conifer forests. George Forrest first introduced it in 1917, and then McLaren in 1938.

Perhaps its most striking feature is the foliage – with a thick wooly coating of rusty cinnamon brown indumentum not only covering the under side of the leaf, but all the branchlets and leaf stalks are similarly coated. The leaves of the new

growth are also a light brown colour making it a very desirable plant.

The flowers are white flushed rose with crimson spots, but these do not appear readily until the plant has aged a little. The plant pictured at EVRG would probably be about 10 years old. It is worth the wait though so don't despair.
