#### IN MY GARDEN by Lesley Gillanders

With Summer behind us we look ahead to what the weather will bring us in Autumn. As we cannot change this we accept what comes, maybe with a grumble here and there or a sigh of relief as the anticipated but elusive rain gently soaks into our parched gardens.

Summer hardy perennials like *Salvia patens* which brightens the garden with brilliant deep blue flowers makes a lovely and lasting display of colour with the three plants we have. We have been gathering the seed as they ripen but some always fall to the ground and from last years fallen seed several little plants have established themselves which will flower next year. Ken has never been keen to grow annuals but *Schizanthus grahamii* has surprised us with its vigorous growth. The unusual colour combination of the flowers in yellow and crimson catches the eye.

The garden at the back of the house has been a constant problem as the blackbirds have constantly churned it up. The problem is solved. Ken has planted it with hundreds of *Cycla-men hederifolium, C.coum* and *C.persicum.* After this tedious job the bed was mulched with material from our chipper, then covered with bird netting and pegged down all round. Of course, some of the perennials are under it like Hostas and Tricyrtis but we have beaten the birds. The green netting does not offend the eye too much and the *Cyclamen* flowers have come up through it. It will be a massive job to take it off later. Perhaps it will stay there. Ken has isolated a deep purple *C. hederifolium* It has no contrasting colour on the "nose" and was raised from seed of a hybrid called *C.*'Ruby Red'

Our *Crocus vallicola* with creamy white flowers opened a week ago with long tapering upright petals. A little group of *C.pulchellus* in the front garden is in bloom. It has quite a pretty lavender coloured flower with delicate purple pencil thin lines on the interior of the petals. *Nerines* are always reliable. They have formed tight clumps which Ken will divide later. *N.fothergilli Major* and *N.*'Adelaide' are both in flower with bright orange-red sparkling blooms. *Colchicum speciosum album* has made a nice clump of large goblet-shaped flowers. It always appears later then *C.agrippinum* and *C.autumnale* which have been in flower for a few weeks.


The last of the *Lilium* to flower is *L.henryi* with light orange bloom. We have the upright growing form as opposed to the normal variety which tends to be very pendulous. A delightful little plant is *Oxalis massoniana*. The little bulbs have increased into a neat clump which is not invasive. The brilliant orange flowers sit tightly on the leaves.



I have mentioned before that *Helichrysum humile* is hard to grow and we had 6 plants earlier. A while ago we had only three left and now there is only one. If we lose this last plant it will be most unfortunate as we have been growing this species for nearly fifty years with no hope of access to any other known plant. Another *Helichrysum* which

is easy to grow is *H.sutherlandi*. We collected seed of this species in South Africa. It likes a sunny well drained position and has an overpowering sweet scent. We also collected seed of *Wahlenbergia cuspidata* in Lesotho on the same trip. It has been a mass of colour light blue flowers not unlike a *Campanula*. It has made a dome-shaped plant about 45cm wide and 30cm high. We noticed the bees liked it so we are watching for seed.

*Acer* 'Esk Flamingo' is growing well. The colour of the red stem and variegated leaves are a good contrast against the green of the other shrubs. *Robinia* and *Gleditsia* are a delightful golden colour and brighten up the areas they grow in.
