#### MEETING - GARDEN GATHERING 8TH NOVEMBER 2015

- We will begin with a brief meeting.
- Main talk by Kerry van den Berg "Getting to know the garden". No doubt a daunting task for Kerry and may end up being an extended tour of the garden! Each season would bring surprises, excitement and joy and we are keen to hear about Kerry's experiences.
- **Blooms competition** will be our final for the year. Results will then be collated and the perpetual trophies presented at our Christmas function.

A splash of gold from a *Helianthemum* with bright golden yellow flowers is trailing over the retaining wall beside the ramp at the back of the house. Near it is the shining gold flowers of *Ranunculus cortusifolius*. Further along the wall is a soft pink *Helianthemum* also one with good deep rosy pink coloured flowers. In this bed *Paeony delavayi* has several carmine-red blooms open and beside it grows *P. peregrina* with glowing single red flowers.

As you come up the drive from the gate, *Robinia pseudoacacia* 'Frisia' has produced its golden leaves and a little further up is *Cistus* 'Bennetts White' putting on a pleasing display with large 10cm white flowers. Also in this garden is *Cercis canadensis* 'Forest Pansy' with purple leaves just coming. It has small pink flowers but produces only one or two in this form. The normal green form of *Cercis,* which we saw in Turkey was a mass of pink flowers.

On the opposite side of the drive our *Paulownia kawakamii* 'Sapphire Dragon' is a mass of blooms. It is quite spectacular with lavender blue upright 20cm conical trusses of flowers. We were amazed last year when it flowered for the first time at two years of age. At three years it is superb. Now that the *Grevillea robusta* plus a large Liquidamber and equally large Acer have been removed, this garden should flourish. *Rhododendron* 'Taurus' a brilliant red and *R*.'White Gold' which is white with a yellow throat have finally come on well. Just below the garage Ken built a long retaining wall of Besser blocks and planted the whole length with yellow *Helinthemum* and blue *Aubrieta* which are very colourful. *Weigelia middendorfian* has creamy yellow blooms, with an orange throat, is growing well in the side garden. *Azara lanceolata* with long lance-shaped leaves is covered in golden tufted flowers of clusters of stamens. *Sophora toromiro* from Easter Island has produced its large pea-shaped yellow blooms. This is a very rare plant and now extinct on Easter Island. We were given this plant by a reputable nurseryman in Victoria.

At last we have a small plant of *Rhododendron valentenianum*. We had it years ago and lost it. It has attractive golden flowers and hairy foliage. Ken planted it in the rock garden along with small growing *R*.'Moth' with deep yellow flowers, *R*.'Oban' with pink flowers and *R*.'Wee Bee' which is also pink. One of my favourite plants is *Rhododendron orbiculare* with rosy pink bell shaped blooms. We have two plants, one in shade which is growing well. The other is in full sun but in a drier position and not quite as robust.





*Viola* 'Irish Molly' is a delight. The unusual colour is hard to describe. It appears to be brown but is more of an amber shaded with green and gold. *Dryas octopetala* is an interesting prostrate ground cover. The tiny *Oak*- shaped leaves are attractive and the white flowers rise on 10cm stems. This plant is widespread in some of the mountain regions of Europe. We have in flower a nice specimen of *Clematis aristata*, a native of Tasmania with pretty star shaped small white flowers. There is a specimen of *C*.'The President' growing with it. The large deep blue flowers are quite a contrast.

We have several plants of *Lewisia cotyledon* in full flower. The colour range is amazing with shadings of orange, yellow and various pinks. There is also a nice white one. They like a well drained spot and are tolerant of both sun and shade. *Iris attica* has sweet little blue flowers only 5cm high. There is a plant of *Penstemon* 'Pink Dragon' in the rock garden with lovely pink blooms. This only grows to10cm high.

*Moraea lurida* is an interesting bulb. The small *Iris*-like flowers seem to last a day but have a succession of soft mushroom pink flowers with a bright golden spot at the base of each petal. The three upright have a blue central stripe.

Diplarrhena latifolia 'Amethyst Fairy' has decided it likes its position. We named this selection when we had it at the nursery at Longley. The purple markings on the intense white flowers are quite pronounced. We actually lost our main plant when we moved to this garden but a former customer in Northern Tasmania has grown it prolifically and we were able to accept his generous off of a few plants, which proves the point that to share your garden with friends, when you lose something, there is a chance of obtaining one again.

This included the building of the home, the dams, the nursery infrastructure, developing the nursery, raising a family and not to be forgotten, the adverse weather conditions of raging bush fires and massive snowfalls.
