## IN MY GARDEN by Lesley Gillanders

We have our first autumn colour but I am not sure if it is an early autumn or are the plants in need of more water due to the continuing dry conditions. Ken spends a lot of time watering. He feels he can give the plants a better dose of water instead of the sprinkler system he has installed.

Autumn *Crocus* have produced their pretty blooms. *C. mathewii* is most attractive with white flowers which have a deep blue colour part way up the petals. *C.vallicola* flowered very early with creamy white pointed petals. *C.goulimyi alba* was raised from seed but there is a mixed lot of lilac and white flowers. *Cochicum illyricum* was also early. The flowers opened white, then each petal developed a pleasing colour of mauve pink.

A slow walk around the garden today was rewarded with seeing, in the rock garden, an attractive plant with yellow flowers the size of a 20cent coin. It is *Linum arboreum*. Nearby was a plant of *Campanula* 'Warley White' with lovely glistening double flowers. Ken tried for years to obtain *Daphne aurantiaca* and at last received some cuttings from a friend. He now has 3 plants in the rock garden. One has a bright yellow flower open with the promise of more to come. Another special *Daphne* is *D.jezoensis* which is covered in yellow buds. *Oxalis massoniana* is a pretty orange ball of colour. It has not spread everywhere like some of the other species.

The hypertufa troughs have been moved from the shaded side of the back patio to sit in full sun against the house. The troughs of *Cyclamen mirabile* and *C.libanoticum* have not been moved as they prefer a little more shade but have been repotted. There is a fine plant of *Cyclamen hederifolium* 'Ruby Red' isolated at the front of the house. It is an intensely deep colour of red. Seed from a previous flowering have come on well and Ken has planted some in a sheltered corner of the garden. Likewise with *C.mirabile* They should develop into a nice patch. Another area has some seedlings of *C.graecum*. They have such lovely velvety leaves.

Podophyllum 'Spotty Dotty' last year had several flowers. They hung in little bunches under the leaves and were a rich carmine colour. The leaves are aptly described by the catchy name. Unfortunately the seed pods were empty but maybe next time will be better. Salvia patens with intense clear blue flowers always set a lot of seed. When gathering it some fall to the ground and the following year produce new plants. They are never a pest and add a pleasant amount of colour at this time.

Years ago when we had the nursery at Longley, Eric Genat and his wife, from Genets Bulb Nursery in Victoria, came to visit and see the garden. Not long after the visit we received a parcel of *Nerine* bulbs from Eric. We never flowered all in that garden but brought one with us which is called *Nerine* 'Genats Pink' It is a pretty creamy pink flower but has not increased much yet.

There are several plants around the garden of *Camellia sinensis pink* This is reputedly the tea *Camellia* which has white flowers. We have the form with a pink centre and the flowers are small, about the size of a 50cent coin.

The *Paulownia* last year flowered very well and set large bunches of seed. They have a sticky coating which I discovered when I felt a pod and had a job to clean my fingers afterwards. Ken has pruned the lower branches where the weight was weighing them down. He has removed a barrow load of pods so far from where he can reach with the long cutters but will have to wait till one of our sons or grandsons come and can be persuaded to remove the rest. The flower spikes are well advanced for the next lot of lovely blooms.

Much to Kens delight his passionfruit, *Passiflora* edulis, finally decided to grow and flower. He estimates he will get a bucketful of fruit if the weather stays warm. They will top a lot of Pavlovas!!
