At the beginning of the month, we had strong winds and a nice amount of rain, which did cause a bit of damage here in the garden. R. arboreum ssp. zeylanícum

R.arboreum ssp. zeylanicum is the only rhododendron species found on the island of Sri Lanka and it grows on hillsides in forests at elevations of 900-2745 m. (3,000-9,000 ft.) This delightful plant forms a broadly upright tree growing to 2-10m. (6-35 ft.)

The leaves are ovate-elliptic, upper surface dark green, very bullate and recurved on the edges, the underside with a thick fawn covering



of two different types of hairs which is called indumentum. Flowers form a tight dome truss deep crimson in colour with 5 nectar pouches at the base.

R. zeylanicum was first introduced to western gardens in the 1830s and flowered for the first time in 1850 in Sir Charles Lemon's garden at Carclew Cornwell. Here at Emu Valley Rhododendron Garden our largest plant of R. zeylanicum stands over 4m tall and covers itself with hundreds of blooms each year. We have an area set aside for Sri Lanka in our countries of origin where we have a number of plants growing well.

R.zeylanicum is one of the aristocrats of the rhododendron world, a wonderfully shaped shrub with beautiful foliage and flowers, well worth growing in any garden. *Maurie*
