The new growth on the Acer Capillipes (Snake bark maple), are quite striking and has received a lot of attention during the week, especially when we had a walking group through for the day. It is native to mountainous areas of Japan.

The rhododendrons are beginning to flower and are looking fantastic, even some of the big leaf varieties are

still in colour so if you have missed them, then come and see them quick! Flowering at the moment in the garden and up at the nursery are R. irroratum 'Polka Dot', R. lutescens, R. liliiflorum, R. dendrocharis, R. boothii mishmiense, R. 'Bibiani', R. 'PJM', R. 'Freckle Pink' and of course this is only naming a small handful!

Rhododendron excellens

R. excellens was introduced to western gardens in 1980 from south of the Red River from Mengtze, South Yunnan and we were fortunate to acquire a few seeds in 1990. Only one plant grew out of those seeds and it formed a compact rounded shrub to one metre high producing large white perfumed flowers with a large yellow centre. The emerging buds are quite green before opening, making quite an attractive feature.

However we went on to receive further seed collected from North Vietnam and South Yunnan which have produced a more open plant leaves and flowers being the same as the

original plant we grew. Rhododendron excellens is similar to R.nuttallii with large fragrant white flowers, but there are fewer flowers in the truss. It belongs in the Dalhousiae Alliance - Subsection Maddenii.

To check on the plants at Emu Valley, the first plant mentioned is to be found on the left hand side as you enter the Yunnan section along the Noel Sullivan Walk. The other collections may be viewed near the North-Eastern corner of the Wisteria car park. *Maurie*
