As Summer fades and Autumn draws closer, we can be thankful we have not had to be burdened with the excessive heat other gardeners on mainland Australia have endured. Certainly we experienced a few hot (for Tasmania) days with some damage.

Our *Calochortus fimbriatus* flowers were a complete disaster. We have only one bulb and we were looking forward to the speckled flowers setting seed as it did last year. Now the flowers are crisp and brown but the bulb should be all right. In 1999 on a trek up Mt Kilmanjaro we saw a pink

form of *Gladiolus dalenii* in flower. Later, we obtained some seed from an overseas garden club which turned out to be an orange form which is quite nice. On a particularly hot day two weeks ago the flowers barely lasted one day. Luckily another patch in a different part of the garden have just opened their orange flowers so we hope to get some seed from them. *Gladiolus saundersii* are still producing their bright salmon-red flowers with a cream throat. They are in the garden at the side of the house.

We have two plants of *Relhania pungens* a prostrate plant with grey-green *Juniper*-like narrow leaves and bright yellow daisy-like flowers which loves the sun. One plant is at the

top edge of the ramp and the other is in the rock garden. Earlier in the summer *Clematis integrifolia* had its deep blue flowers open. Our plant is only 30cm high and has made a clump. At this time the spent flower heads have turned into a silvery shining mass of fluffy seed heads.

*Hippeastrum papilio* loved the warm days. Ken had moved the tight clump of bulbs into a sunny position at the edge of the raised bed outside the lounge. They excelled themselves by successively producing eight flower stems each holding two of their large cream and red flowers. We harvested a copious amount of seed from them. The bird net has finally been taken off the garden under the two *Prunus* 'Mt Fuji'. Ken then spread a heavy layer of mulch over the area hoping to deter the blackbirds from scratching out the *Cyclamen hederifolium*. It took only one day for them to start to overturn the area and scratch out the corms. Some rat traps were set with bright red glace cherries with good results. We are hoping to have a colourful display of *Cyclamen* in the next few months.

*Tigridia pavonia* which is sometimes known as "Jockeys Cap" will have to be moved from under the shade of the *Paulownia* to an area where it gets full sun. We had only one or two flowers this year. *Cypella coelestris* has flowers like an *Iris* and produce a succession of attractive pale blue flowers on the tips of the metre high upright stems. The flowers only last one day but are worth waiting for. We had ten flowers open today from a group of several bulbs.



Wahlebergia gloriosa

The floral emblem of the Australian Capitol Territory is *Wahlenbergia gloriosa* Known as the Royal Blue Bell it is a prostrate little plant with bright blue flowers on 20cm wiry stems. The single flowers have pointed petals and are slightly larger than a 20 cent coin. I painted a picture of it years ago and have the urge to paint it again. We had lost it some time ago but thanks to two friends who grew it we now have two plants doing well and in flower.

plant is large enough it will be planted out in the rock garden *C. carpatica* is a mass of white blooms and quite impressive.

*Philadelphus* flowered well through the summer. *P.*'Belle Etoile' and *P.*'Sybille' are two of my favourites in this genus. They have white flowers with a pink throat and a lovely fruity perfume. A fairly recent introduction is *Ceratopetalum gummiferum* 'Johannas' Christmas' This is a dwarf shrubby form of the New South Wales Christmas Bush. It grows to about one metre high. The most attractive feature is the brilliant red bracts which follow the small white flowers.
