Sue's Corner

Sometimes it's the unexpected that inspires! Early in May, the main arterial road heading south out of Burnie – Mount Street – was scheduled to be surfaced over several days during the hours of 6pm to 6am. One of the first tasks of the contractors was to remove the many, many patches of bitumen that have been applied, plus heaps of bumps that had formed, over the years, to provide a level base.

A grinding machine removes these imperfections and the waste material, called grindings, is loaded in a truck, removed from site and stockpiled for selling as filling, etc. Several of our volunteers wondered if this material could be applied to a couple of our roads in the garden in lieu of blue metal that tends to wash away in heavy rain.

After numerous phone calls, arrangements were made with the supervisor of the work to deliver 5 truck loads of grindings during the wee small hours. And since then, our volunteers have been loading the grindings onto the ute with the bucket on the tractor, driving to the most needed locations, shovelling the grindings off the ute and spreading it by hand, before whacka - packing it down. They reckon they are about half done! The unexpected? The contractors – Venarche – provided the grindings free of charge AND donated the cartage thereof. The inspiration? From a small seed of an idea, as the possibility grew, so too did the volunteer's commitment and enthusiasm to realise their vision. It's yet another example of extraordinary

> generosity and co-operation that this garden engenders. We are most blessed.

R. argyophyllum Ssp nankingense

Subsection Argyrophylla consists of many fine species with Ssp. nankingense one of the finest, with broad, slightly rugose dark green leaves with the underside covered with a thin fine-textured white plastered indumentum.

In its native home Nanking China it can grow to around ten metres but in cultivation may only reach three metres. When seen covered with fine trusses of deep pink flowers it is outstanding.

Seed became available to western gardens in 1932 when Mr. Albert Steward of the College of Agriculture, University of Nanking, China sent seed to

the Royal Botanic Garden, Edinburgh where it flowered for the first time in 1946.

At Emu Valley Rhododendron Garden we grow Ssp. Nankingense, also the delightful clone 'Chinese Silver', which is an outstanding plant especially when the wind ruffles the leaves exposing the beautiful white underside. Plants can be viewed along the Noel Sullivan Walk in Yunnan and on the right hand side of the road to the 'Chinese Pavilion' in Guizhou just after the stand of Japanese cedar Cryptomeria japonica. *Maurie*
