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#### *R. cuneatum*

George Forrest first introduced Rhododendron cuneatum to western gardens in 1913 having come across it in 1910 in the mountains to the northeast of the Yangtze bend in Yunnan. Later collected by others including Kingdon-Ward, Rock and McLaren from the Yulong Shan in Yunnan and in southwest Sichuan, China.

In cultivation it is a compact shrub to 1.5 metres but in the wild it can grow to twice this height. However most of its relatives in Subsection Lapponica grow to less than one metre.

The leaves are broadly elliptic sometimes aromatic and

the rust –coloured scales are easy to see (these scales are typical of lepidote rhododendrons.) The flowers are freely produced in trusses of 3-6 and can range in colour from rose-lavender, purple to lavender-blue, with or without deeper spots inside.

At Emu Valley Rhododendron Garden we grow many of subsection lapponica including R.cuneatum that can be seen flowering in all its glory in Yunnan and Sichuam areas in mid October. *Maurie*
