IN MY GARDEN by Lesley Gillanders

It was a relief to see the garden slowly waking up from its winter sleep. There are three plants of *Daphne bholua* in the garden and there are two honeyeaters diligently feasting on the nectar. *Daphne genkwa* is called *'D.Blue Daphne'* due to the lavender -blue which open up the stems and held in clusters like *Daphne odora rubra*'.

Magnolia 'Star Wars' seemed to take ages to open. The large pink blooms on bare branches are quite eye catching. *M*.'Black Tulip' has deep purple black goblets shaped blooms. While '*Michaelia doltsopa*' with large white blooms has had a name change and is now classed as *Magnolia doltsopa*. Ken bought a *Eucalyptus caesia* last year but the plant died and this week was able to purchase another one, so hope it will survive. It has an attractive white bark and enormous pink flowers.

Many years ago Ken produced a batch of seedling *Rhododendron* while we were at Longley. He planted several of these hybrids in the garden and called them *R*. 'Woodbank Hybrid'. This was a cross between *R*.'Little Glendoe' and *R.aureum* They flower in early August and even though frost ruins the blooms, it produces more as spring takes hold. *R*.'Ptarmigan' is a small plant in the rock garden with small white flowers. *Enkianthus serrulotus* with large creamy white bells on deciduous branches is one meter high. It is in a shaded bed at the front of the house

Some *Crocus* have already finished flowering but many more will open. *C. vernus* The Bishop' has large deep purple flowers. *Anemone seemani* is a prostrate plant growing in a cool moist position. It has golden yellow flowers. South Africa has a wide distribution of bulbs. *Romulea are* some of the most colourful bulbs *R.bulbacodium* has lavender pink flowers, *R.citrina* has yellow flowers. *R.monophylla* has red flowers. All of them only open in the sun. *Geissorhiza radicans* flowered for the first time last

year. The flood washed a lot of them away but we have a few that survived and are in flower now. The centre of the flower is bright scarlet edged with a thin white line and the outer petals are deep purple.

There are many species and hybrids of Narcissus. Most people have 'N.'King Alfred' and N.'Fortune', two old varieties with tall stems reaching to 60cm. One that grows prolifically is N.'Jetfire' a vigorous hybrid to 40cm which have increased quickly after dividing them last year. They will need to be divided again. N.bulbicodium a popular species known as Hoop Petticoat daffodil grows well and a selected form is N.b.obesus with a flared trumpet. These days there are numerous new varieties.





Leucodendron 'Devils Blush' is a plant with attractive creamy yellow bracts with red tips. The flowers are a small tight cluster in the centre. Ken has planted it in a dry spot near other Leucodendron, Leucospermum and Proteas not far from a large Eucalyptus.

There are two *Frittillaria* open at present. Both have lost their labels, so a search is on to try to identify each one. They are most interesting, both being black. We have a number of books to check through, so hopefully we will track their names correctly. Now is the time to enjoy other species. *F.verticillata* a lovely creamy colour, *Fritillaria uva ursi* is easy to grow with yellow and brown flowers, *F.meleagris*, the Snakes Head Fritillary, *F.imperialis* known as the Crown Imperial, with either orange or yellow flowers. In England, there are specialist groups mainly interested in *Fritillaria* associated with Rock Garden Clubs.
