

Social Meeting November 18th



In the Garden at Christmas

Plenty still to see and do as we move into the first month of Summer! Although we are upgrading the irrigation system in January, the current system still needs a bit of TLC as we have been watering the last couple of months and the plants can't wait (and neither can Maurie) for a reliable and mapped out system.



We have had an exceptional flowering season this year and I believe the garden is looking the best it has in some time. At the moment our Kalmia corner is catching visitor's eyes as they head into North America and I hope to expand this area over the next few years. We are finding that kalmias strike better from younger plants or growing from seed and this is why I have a small stash of them in the nursery, and not for sale as they are needed for stock. But if you can ever get your hands on one or ten, then you

won't be disappointed! Fantastic display of colours and they flower for ages.

Recently we have had a few small projects on the go and they consist of adding new walking tracks in, rock edging paths that look like they had been forgotten. They are now so much more inviting. A gabion wall added to the Chinese pavilion entrance, seats and picnic tables are in the process of getting a new coat of paint or old pieces of timber replaced. It's a place that you can visit on any number of occasions and there will always be something different to see and explore.

Two Tasmanian Icons

Rhododendron faberi



Rhododendron faberi is yet another member of subsection Taliensia growing in Sichuan, China. An easy to grow species with the usual thick woolly, rust-coloured or dark indumentum under the leaves which takes a little time to develop, then is shed to reveal a thin whitish layer of indumentum. Grown in the open it forms a compact rounded shrub to about 1.5 meters in height and densely covered with dark green leaves.

The pinkish buds open white with a pink flush which soon disappears as the flower matures, these may or may not have a dark blotch or red spots.

R. faberi was discovered by Rev. E Faber around 1887 on the summit of Mt. Omei in western Sichuan and was described in 1889. Other collectors were successful in also finding it in the same area. It has taken us quite a while to source seed of this somewhat rare species but the few plants we have are growing well. However we are propagating more. If you wish to locate these plants look for the nametag partway down the top road on the left hand side. Good hunting. *Maurie*
