The society recently received a very generous donation of a superb collection of satsuki azaleas from Margaret Smith, a colleague of Alan Kepert and a long-time collector of these beautiful plants. She has donated 25 varieties including Hakurei, Juko, Wakaebisu, Komei, Chiyo-No-Homare, Koryu and Benzikari; some of them imported long ago from Japan.

The plan is to keep these potted specimens as stock plants and propagate them to build a permanent display in the Japanese section of DRBG.

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Rhododendron in focus: Rhododendron arboreum ssp. delavayi

Subsection Hymenanthes

This was originally regarded as a separate species but due to overlapping of its characteristics with *R. arboreum* it was moved by Chamberlain (Edinburgh) to subspecies status. It is found in NE India, Burma, Thailand, and SW China at 1500 to 3000 metres. It is regarded as frost-tender in England.

We have around 100 planted in the garden mostly towards the north end in the *arboreum* bed or along the fence along Falls Road. If you feel like a healthy walk in late September or early October you can see a magnificent show of blood red flowers (see photo)

North Queensland project progress and the Simon Begg NQ display bed

The Society recently reported progress on the North Queensland project to James Cook University to whom we are contracted. We have successfully met our first milestone with supplies purchased for cultivation and housing of the potted collection and materials for the outdoor bed.

There has been an excellent survival rate of wild-collected cuttings of *R. viriosum* and *R. lochiae* collected during 2016 & 2017, with 43 of 47 accessions established in cultivation at DRBG, including at least one accession from every mountain. Some of the wild-collected rhododendrons are within a year of flowering and trusses will be collected for herbarium specimens as they come into flower.

Two wild-collected cuttings from each accession will be kept as potted specimens so as to ensure a well-labelled reference collection. Surplus plants and new cuttings from the wild collected plants will be used to establish the public display. ARS-Vic is currently bulking up plants for eventual establishment in the permanent display bed.



In consultation with Parks Victoria management, a site has been identified at DRBG for a North Queensland bed to permanently display *R. viriosum, R. lochiae* and companion plants. The Society has received a generous bequest from the Estate of Simon Begg that the society proposes to allocate to the establishment and maintenance of the bed and we will propose to Parks that the bed be named in honour of Simon who was the driving force behind this project.

The site is in the newly acquired block of land which was part of the former Olinda Golf Course that has been added to the DRBG. The bed has not yet been designed however the site is approximately 60m x 20m providing ample space for the



rhododendrons and their companion plants. The backbone of the bed will be large granite boulders reflecting the geology of the NQ mountain tops. Some have already been purchased and delivered using the grant money from JCU.

DRBG has applied for funds through a Victorian Government grant program, that if successful, will fund a garden masterplan and a deer-proof fence, and relevant to this project, irrigation infrastructure for the recently acquired land. Parks Victoria are waiting to see whether they have been successful.

The society and Parks Victoria are liaising with Warren Worboys, RBG Cranbourne regarding the companion plants wild-collected during 2019 that are being propagated at RBG Cranbourne. A list has been provided to Warren Worboys of species the Society and Parks Victoria believe could be suitable for outdoor display at DRBG.

Establishing Simon's North Queensland bed will require some of the work to be sub- contracted. Parks Victoria must hold the contracts for work undertaken within the gardens, so project funds held by the society for the establishment of Simon's North Queensland bed will be paid, under an agreement, to Parks Victoria to contract the works.
