
We are working very hard on a new area within the garden and hope to have the official unveiling around September /October so I will add snippets of what some of us have been up to but without giving too much away of course. Below are the first photos with plenty more to come. 😊

We have had Adam Saward in to make a start on a new track up to the top water tanks which will be for Kubota and ATV/ plant equipment, no other vehicle access but of course you can go for a leisurely walk/hike if you would like. This has been on our radar for quite some time so it is a great feeling to have yet another road ticked off the wish list. The benefits of cutting a track in is for a number of reasons:

- * To be able to get to the top of the tanks quickly in the kubota to shut down the mains if we have any water leaks/blow outs.
- * Can now access this area easily and safely to mulch with the bales which has been a job that we have tried avoiding as its been too much of a hard slog to drag the bales up hill
- *feeding plants with many heavy bags of fertilizer loaded up in the Kubota
- *Spraying and keeping weeds at a minimum will be achievable as it was only ever accessible on foot previously
- *carrying new plants directly to the area, irrigation lines, drippers and tools for plant maintenance.

Sam Biggins and his son (long time garden members) came in during the week with a massive bag or three of gorgeous daffodil bulbs. They even stayed and helped me plant them, what gentlemen! Keep an eye on the garden surrounding lake Grebe for these gorgeous bulbs to pop up and flower as they will be a little bit special.... bring on Spring already! Plenty to do and heaps to see and enjoy so I better keep moving and defreeze!

Rhododendron lepidostylum

Some rhododendrons are renowned for spectacular flowers while others produce interesting foliage. *R. lepidostylum* fits well into the latter. This and the beautiful elipidote *R. campanulatum* subsp. *aeruginosum* have the bluest foliage in the genus, for those who are interested in exotic colours in the landscape.

Other interesting features are the rather densely bristly margins to the leaves, branchlets, pedicels, calyx and to some extent the flower tube, these bristles are white while the underside is quite glaucous, especially the young leaves producing quite an interesting feature. The flower colour is pale yellow or yellow

with or without orange spots. Unfortunately the new growth appears at the same time as the flowers so they tend to get a little lost but the beautiful bluish-green foliage covering the bush more than makes up for this.

George Forrest, while visiting Yunnan, discovered this species in June 1919 on the Jangtzow Shan, Shweli-Salwin divide. It was found growing on cliffs and in steep gullies and was introduced to western gardeners in 1924. It has become a popular species in some places. The plants we have growing at Emu Valley are around 600mm high and over 1.5m in diameter growing in full sun. *Maurie*
