

President's Musings

The internet is sometimes a wonderful tool, an excusable way to waste time and also something that often reveals unlooked for information. Recently, while searching for images of the rhododendron Helene Berndt, of which I have a cutting, I came across this site 'MLBG Ch 9 Appendix final 2006 Adelaide Botanic Gardens'. My excuse to 'waste time'. I had to investigate.

What I found was a report about the MLBG from 1963 relating Dr Noel Lothian's objectives for the Garden which was to cultivate species and subspecies of exotics, the first plantings being ferns and rhododendrons. In this report there followed a list of rhododendron plants at the MLBG, Pirianda Garden, Melbourne Botanic Garden, Dandenong Ranges Botanic Garden (Olinda), Mt Tomah and the National Botanic Garden. Of the listed gardens, Pirianda, the former home and garden of Harvey and Gillian Ansell, is now managed by Parks Victoria; parts of Mt Tomah, in the Blue Mountains, was affected by the 2020 bushfires. Since 1963 the MLBG has also suffered the destruction of fire.

Rhododendrons were listed for all gardens with the DRBG having the largest number of plants followed closely by the MLBG. Pirianda and Mt Tomah had quite a few less than SA and the other two gardens fairly negligible. Unfortunately the report and list was far too long to print being over fifteen pages long. What struck me from reading this information was how important the SA collections of plants are and that we need to value them more highly. I now look differently at the Whibley collection and those older rhododendrons saved from the freeway construction. Their importance in the State's social gardening history is important as are our attempts to propagate them. They were originally cultivated to cope with our climate so are hardy and therefore good to pass on to new rhododendron gardeners.

Those of you who could not attend April's meeting missed an entertaining and informative talk where Shinya Ueda discussed and demonstrated pruning techniques. Before you grab your pruning implements remember Shinya's advice. "Before you start, look at the plant. Decide what you want the plant to look like after you have pruned. Then prune."

Our next speaker will take us into the world of weeds. Let's hope we come out unscathed.




Next Meeting

Have you considered raising a new Rhododendron from seed rather than using cuttings?

If you look carefully in your own garden you may find that nature has set some seed for you. The seed capsules should be nearing maturity and when they turn brown and possibly start to open at the end they should be collected and put into a container where they can open fully and


discharge their seed. If you don't have seed but would still like to try we should have a supply of Vireya seed for members in the next few weeks. All you need is a warm box and some patience! Interested members can speak to Richard who will provide instruction on how to sow and raise the seed.

This is the most popular way of producing new hybrid rhododendrons and is a common method employed overseas.
