Rhododendron prínophyllum

Rhododendron prinophyllum is one of a number of deciduous azalea species native to the eastern states of north America and Canada. It was introduced to Europe early in the 1800s, where it proved to be quite hardy.

R. prinophyllum forms a shrub to 3m in the wild, but usually smaller in cultivation. The tubular-funnel shaped rose pink, sometimes white flowers are rather densely glandular on the outside and are produced in flat topped terminal trusses of 5-10 flowers usually at the same time as the elliptic or oblong-obovate dull light green leaves appear.

As R. prinophyllum grows near to and is related to R.periclymenoides in the wild hybrid swarms between these two are bound to happen.

At Emu Valley Garden we grow a couple of forms of this plant, the one in the picture could even be one of these hybrids with R. periclynenoides as it usually has 12-15 deep pink flowers and is more showy than R. prinophyllum, still a delightful plant. *Maurie*
