Vale Eric Weeks

Very sadly, Eric Weeks died on 26 June.

He was a Life Member, Treasurer for many years and the sole creator of all the dry-stone walling within the garden (a huge feat on its own). He was a generous, kind, and patient man, much respected and loved by all. He always helped with hay carting, and he would supply members with tomatoes from his garden. He

supported Essendon and loved the horses.

When Eric was awarded Life Membership in 2014, Maurie Kupsch had this to say: "Eric's contribution to Emu Valley has been nothing less than outstanding.

His involvement spreads over a period of 25 years, with the last 17 years carrying the responsibility of Treasurer. A quite incredible contribution which has involved many hours work, particularly when the Tea Room is operating. It is Eric who collects and counts the days takings then returns with the float each morning to have all in readiness for the volunteers that day. He never even complains when the wrong numbers are pressed to produce the most unlikely results on the till.

The early days saw Eric working closely with the late Terry Shadbolt during the tree felling and clearing of the original block. Using their 4WDs, they collected rocks, pine bark, hay bales, in fact just about anything needed in the garden. Many loads of firewood were produced for raffles.

But there has been much more. Eric has become the Garden's stone wall builder extraordinaire. Since his early days in the Garden under the tuition of the late Peter de Bomford, Eric has literally built Kilometres of stone walls and gone through thousands of tonnes of stone. His last haul consisted of 10 to 12 truckloads of stone which was expected to last him 2 years, but they are quickly disappearing.

Mention a BBQ at the garden, and it's always Eric who will be the Chef.

Eric has always been a dedicated promoter of our Garden, and the hospitality offered by the Weeks allow many guests from interstate and overseas to be able to spend time at Emu Valley.

Eric's contribution has been crucial to the Garden's success, and he is a very worthy recipient of Life Membership of the Emu Valley Rhododendron Garden."

You always knew when he did not approve of something in the garden as he would preface what he was about to say with, "if it were my garden..."

Rhododendron anthosphaerum

Subsection Irrorata contains a number of unique species including R. anthosphaerum.

R. anthosphaerum was discovered by the Abbe Delavay in 1897 at Mo-so-yn, Tali valley, Yunnan. In1906 Forrest collected it on the Sungkwei Pass north-west Yunnan, later more collections were made by him and other plant hunters in Myanmar (Upper Burma) and south-east Tibet showing the wide geographical distribution of the species. Forrest introduced it in 1910.

R. anthosphaerum can be a low shrub or a small tree 4.5m high with oblong, obovate to oblanceolate dark green leaves, the lower surface mainly glabrous. The flowers are presented in tight trusses of 8-15 and are tubular- campanulate with dark nectar pouches and can be pale pink, rose, lavender, lilac to deep magenta, they can be blotched or spotted.

Our plants at Emu Valley are tall growing, with new growth a dark red, the flower colour ranges from rose to lavender- purple and can be located on the top side of the middle road in Myanmar and Yunnan. *Maurie*
